CYBER SAFETY is everyone's business and we can't bury our head in the sand. There is a talk next week Tuesday (22nd) at 6.30pm on this topic for parents and staff. You're welcome.

You will see a few Positions Vacant in this week's Pabulum. In particular, The School Coordinator/Community Development position is a strengthening of our support for the teachers and the school as a whole. It comes out of a continuing review process and an acknowledgement of how much we have grown but also consolidated. We are no longer a pioneering High School and the needs have changed over time. As a result, Mark Phillips the current High School Coordinator (and today celebrating his birthday) is stepping sideways to focus even more on Staff and Curriculum Development. After 20 years working in the school, Mark re-imagined and re-started the part-time Steiner Primary Teacher Training Course (36 participants) this year. Next year he will continue that work and also be funded to work intensively with staff (approximately 17 individuals) on developing their understanding of and practice in Steiner Education. Our aim is always to be enlivening and strengthening the experience children have with their teachers. We seek teachers who are engaging students and who are coming from the ethos of Steiner Education in all their work. This doesn't happen accidentally! So the school is investing significantly in this work via Mark's new role mainly with High School teachers as well as other initiatives in the Primary school with Kevin Mazzer.

The advertised **Facilities and Grounds Coordinator** position is a strengthening of our school's adherence to OH&S, Risk Management, Budgeting and Approval processes and Staffing Management. This will ensure increased compliance and the appointment fills a gap in a complex area of the school.




It was messy and a great challenge, the class once again demonstrated how capable, enthusiastic and engaged they are in their school life.





CLASS 10 TERM 3 WARRDAGGA CAMP

Class 10 Warrdagga Camp was a definite highlight for 2019.

Warrdagga Rock is located within Ninghan Station approximately 400km North East of Perth. This ancient landscape holds deep cultural significance to Aboriginal people for a number of reasons, including a male initiation site and women's birthing area. We were very fortunate to have local Yamaji men Ashley and Drew Bell speak with us about the stories of Warrdagga and life in tune with the plants, animals and spirits of the land.



The camp itself is facilitated by a team of experienced outdoor educators and PWS staff. This said, the days were largely student led with a focus on wandering the landscape in-tune with the natural rhythms of the day. These rhythms include drawing inspiration from sunrise, resting during the heat of the day and taking time to reflect and philosophise during the wisdom of the night. Students slept under tarpaulins and cooked nutritious meals over open fires, beneath star filled skies.

It was a magic 6 days where time ceased to exist and students took full advantage of their opportunity to deepen their own relationship to the natural area, with themselves and with one another as a class.

As always it has been a pleasure teaching Class 10 and joining them on their Warrdagga camp. They truly are a dynamic class of high energy and deep thinking individuals, never afraid to meet a challenge and truly at their best when working together under pressure.
